To help the transformation of PNG's public service, Australia and PNG Ministers committed in December to the creation of the Pacific Leadership and Governance Precinct.

This will support the revitalisation of PNG's Institute of Public Administration and the transformation of the School of Business Administration at the University of PNG into the School of Business and Public Policy.

We share a vision for the Precinct to build PNG's next generation of ethical and high performing public sector leaders at all levels of government and be a centre for discussion and debate on issues of national importance.

Transforming this historic building into a new modern facility marks a new era for the IPA as it becomes the Papua New Guinea School of Government (PNGSoG).

But the building is not as important as the training and the discussions that will be fostered within it.

Just like the Bully Beef Club before it, we envisage the new facility will bring Papua New Guineans together who are committed to service for their country.

As PNG's economy grows, and becomes more integrated in the global economy, it needs a public service that strengthens and reinforces PNG's international competitiveness.

We are very pleased with the progress we are already seeing at the IPA supported by its new leadership.

New courses supported by the Australian Public Service Commission and the Canberra Institute of Technology are now running at PNGIPA for over 150 Papua New Guinean Public servants. These will lead to diploma level qualifications.

I wish to recognise the particular contributions of the Secretary of the Department of Personnel Management, Mr John Kali, and the PNGIPA Director, Mr Wewerang, under the leadership of the Minister for Public Service and the Prime Minister.

The Precinct program is not simply two, parallel institutional strengthening programs.

We hope to see links created between the two institutions and to see these extended to other institutions in the country dedicated to excellence in public service.

The Precinct we hope will become the 'centre of gravity' for national efforts to improve leadership and governance.

We also hope the Precinct will play a wider role in the Pacific region and become a regional centre of excellence for leadership and governance.

This event today marks a new chapter for the PNGIPA.

Australia is very pleased to be a part of this, especially at this location which is so rich in history that is shared between Australia and PNG.
